The Florida Reading Journal (FRJ) is a peer-reviewed publication for the Florida Reading Association (FRA). The FRJ readership includes classroom teachers, reading coaches, professors and other educators, in addition to preservice teachers.

The focus of the FRJ is to promote an exchange of ideas, including research, teaching practices, personal experiences, book reviews and reviews of professional materials that would be of interest to educators in the field of literacy at all levels. Storytelling and poetry submissions are also accepted. The FRJ serves as an open forum and its contents do not necessarily reflect or imply endorsement of the FRA, its officers, or its members.

#### **Submission Guidelines**

Submissions must be double-spaced, 12-point type, Times New Roman font. Please do not submit articles that are under review by other publications. When submitting a manuscript, please include:

- One proofed electronic copy, APA 5<sup>th</sup> style, in the form of an email attachment to the editor, Katrina Hall (khall@unf.edu)
- Contact information for all authors, including affiliation
- A 25 word abstract

#### **Review Process**

After an initial review, manuscripts will be sent out for blind review to members of the editorial review board. The review process takes 2 to 6 months and acceptance rate is 25%. The editors reserve the right to edit all copy.
