Dear FRA members,

As I write the winter newsletter, we are having one of the rare cold snaps where it actually feels like "my definition" of winter. I am stretched out on my couch with an old family quilt wrapped around my legs for the sole purpose of keeping my feet warm. Instead of curling up with a great book, I'm trying to help my computer beat out the cat for lap space so I can write you a note.

Four years ago on a January day, I was in my office trying to put the finishing touches on my syllabus when my phone rang. On the other end of the phone was a father desperate for someone to help his high school son improve his reading. I asked the father a series of questions and determined that his son probably did not need tutoring or additional reading classes but instead needed a boost of enthusiasm toward reading. I offered to form a "book

club" with his son and four or five of his buddies. The father thought this was a marvelous idea and asked me to repeat my proposal so his wife could hear my idea on their speakerphone.



I went home that evening excited about this new opportunity that I had already turned into a research project. I explained the day's events to my husband and he chuckled to himself and said, "Deb, you aren't going to get five jocks to come read with you every Wednesday night!"The air shot right out of my sails as I realized what sounded like a great idea to this young man's parents and to me probably wouldn't be an exciting venture for five 16 year old Lacrosse players.

The following Monday, I received a call from the Mother saying she had rallied four boys and wondered if I could start on Wednesday. At our first meeting, I realized that even though the term 'rallied' had been used, 'coercing' would have been more accurate. I asked all four of the young men why they were sitting in my office and the answers ranged from, "If I didn't come, my Dad said I couldn't have the car this weekend" to "Mom made me come." I asked the boys to give me one

month. If they weren't enjoying themselves I would cancel the Wednesday night book club and take the responsibility for ending our time together. They enthusiastically agreed.

I had carefully perused my bookshelf for a book that might catch the interest of four adolescent male lacrosse players. I had no idea of their reading level and wanted to find a book that would interest them and that would be easy for them to read without help. I chose *Echohawk* (Durrant,1998) because I remembered a scene in the book where the Native American boys were engaged in a Lacrosse match. I handed each of them a copy and let them determine how much of the novel they would read by the next week. One of the boys commented how "cool it was they got to choose. "They did not like me referring to the group as the boys book club so after a short discussion, they changed it to the Guys' Book Club.

To make a long story short (because my editor limits my words with you) it was a great success. I won them over when I gave them full responsibility for choosing the third novel. They chose the biography *Whatever You Say I Am: The Life and Times of Eminem* (the rapper, not the candy). After Book Club ended, one of the fathers told me they were testing me and were actually shocked that not only did I say OK, but I read it and made it an interesting discussion. We argued, discussed and criticized this piece, um, writing. It was one of the best book club discussions I had witnessed.

We continued book club from January through August and then ran into scheduling problems with the senior school year. I sought permission from all the guys' parents to send a proposal to IRA where they would be my co-presenters. The proposal was accepted but IRA fell the same week as the lacrosse regional tournament and I was fully aware of the ranking of their priorities. I asked them to meet one additional time so I could videotape their discussion for the presentation and they all agreed.

As the discussion wound down, I asked them why this had been such a success. What they said astonished me because in a short span of three minutes, they stated exactly what the research literature said about book clubs:

Guys like to have control of how much they read.

Guys like to work with their friends.

Guys like (really) like expository texts.

Guys like to choose what they read.

What I learned most from this research project was that guys have a real enthusiasm for reading but it isn't the same as mine, or most other female teachers. Literature circles, or book clubs have the potential to engage adolescent males in quality literature. I know this is true because the father that started all this, called me at 10:00pm one summer night to tell me for the first time in his life, he walked into his son's room to say good night and he was reading a book, and not one that had been assigned!

FRA LEGISLATIVE UPDATE from Florence Brainerd ...

FRA's Legislative Advocate

January 2008 update

The Florida Legislature will convene March 4 for the 2008 Session. For the past several months interim committee meetings have been held, customary for this time of year. The big issues of discussion and concern are tax spending, insurance, and how Amendment 1, if passed, will affect education and its budget.

Of the many education bills filed to date and heard in early committee meetings, one of interest to reading educators is SB 286 by Senator Steve Wise of Jacksonville. Its House companion is HB 491 by Rep. Jennifer Carroll, of Duval and Clay countries. The bill specifies in-service requirements for educators who provide instruction in ESOL. If you recall, the Governor vetoed this bill last year. However, this year, it has the approval of Education Commissioner Eric Smith. The Senate Education Committee and Senate Appropriations Committee recently passed the bill. Requirements are:

- (1) For the primary English instructor (Basic ESOL) who is an English/Language Arts teacher, 300 in-service hours or equivalent.
- (2) For an instructor teaching the basic subject areas of reading, mathematics, science, social studies, or computer literacy, 60 in-service hours or equivalent.
- (3) For an instructor teaching other subject areas other than basic ESOL or basic subject areas, 18 in-service hours or equivalent.
- (4) For a school administrator or guidance counselor, 60 in-service hours or equivalent.

Other filed education bills of interest are:

- SB 132 Sen. Wilson Elected Cabinet position for the Commissioner of Education (a joint resolution proposing an amendment to Constitution).
- SB 148 Sen. Wilson Increase in instructional hours for PreK program.
- SB 158 Sen. Wilson Intensive Reading requirements lab hours.
- SB 172 Sen. Wilson Increase salary for beginning teachers.
- SB 180 Sen. Wilson Cost of living increase for teachers PreK-12.
- SB 242 –Sen. Wise Single gender classrooms (optional to schools).
- SB 254 Sen. Wilson Progression Eliminating mandatory retention. (Much language deleted from statute.)
- SB 702 Sen. Rich Mandatory requirements for increased levels of education for PreK instructors.
- SB 1170 Sen. Lynn Assessment End of course testing for high school students.

Be sure to go on line and read the entire content of these listed bills at **www.flsenate.gov** and **www.myfloridahouse.gov**. Also, take time to acquaint yourselves with your legislators, and let them hear from you on issues that are important to you.

Education Commissioner Eric Smith has named Frances Haitcock as the new Chancellor of K-12. The former Chancellor Cheri Yacke left DOE to pursue other educational challenges. She has been a good friend to Florida Reading Association.

Ideas for your teacher bag of tricks

Ensuring Engagement During Independent Reading

Have you ever wondered whether your students are really reading during SSR (Sustained Silent Reading)? Do you have students who often switch books or avoid reading? Are there students in your classroom who have difficulty engaging with text? We answered yes to all of these questions and it led us to rethink independent reading. After four years of successfully using R5 (read, relax, reflect, respond, and rap), our structured independent reading approach, with intermediate-aged students, we have identified eight suggestions for making sure all of your kids are avid, engaged readers.

Tips for Implementing Independent Reading

- 1. Decide what your goals are for independent reading and explicitly describe your goals and expectations for this time. Explain what you will be doing and what the students will be doing.
- 2. Make sure that what you are doing during this time supports students in their reading and conveys the message that this time is highly valued. Examples of how you can do this include observing students, taking a status of the class, or conferring. Non-examples would be answering your email, grading papers, or writing lesson plans.
- 3. Observe your students during independent reading in order to identify those students who have engagement issues, such as pretending to read, frequently getting up, talking instead of reading, or staring into space.
- 4. Have a predictable structure to your independent reading time and make sure it is something you do consistently.
- 5. Know what your students are interested in and make sure you have reading materials they want to read. This means you must know their reading levels and are familiar with children's books or at least have a way to find good books. Knowing their interests and reading levels will guide you in assisting students with text selection. Do not limit text selection based on AR or Lexile levels.
- 6. Build response into your independent reading structure. This can be written and/or spoken.
- 7. Utilize this time as an opportunity to reinforce comprehension strategies taught. This can be accomplished through conferring with students and during response-related activities.
- 8. Model your love for reading by enthusiastically sharing what you are currently reading, giving booktalks, and reading aloud.
