Dear FRA Colleagues:

A few years ago, I was given an opportunity to apply for a grant to participate in a collaborative faculty-student summer research project with four of my undergraduate students. I thought this opportunity would be a great experience for future teachers so I gathered the four students and explained the research concept to them. As a reading specialist and former PE teacher, I was interested in finding children's books that could be used by regular classroom teachers to teach concepts of PE, as well as Art and Music. All four women thought this sounded like an interesting way to spend their summer so we pulled together a proposal that was accepted.



On our first field trip, we traveled to a local library that was known for a large children's section where we encountered a problem I could have never imagined. We were adults. Adults weren't allowed in the children's section without a child. We had no children with us and therefore, we were not allowed in. Seriously, they told us the children's section was only for children's use. I explained our research project to the librarian. It did not matter. I asked to see the manager and although she wasn't willing to let us work in the children's section, she did allow us to browse the shelves, gather an armful of books, and proceed to the two tables in the hallway outside of the children's section to review the books. After a comical day of sending one person in at a

time to grab an armful of books, we quickly developed a routine of reviewing the books and placing them in a keep or return pile. At the end of the day we each checked out the maximum, 30 books, and developed a plan to read them all.

For our research project, every picture book we found was read, categorized, summarized, and ranked. By the end of the summer we had read and catalogued about 400 books relating to PE, Art, and Music. We have presented our findings at the FRA conference as well as other teacher workshops. Here are three of our top picks.

PE: *Mighty Jackie: The Strike Out Queen* by Marissa Moss. Jackie Mitchell lived for baseball. She practiced day and night, only sleeping to dream of playing in a real game. The one problem standing in her way was the fact that she was a girl, something that was frowned upon in the baseball leagues. Through hard work and determination, Jackie strikes out two of the best players in baseball history and shows the world that girls can play baseball!

Art: *The Dot* by Peter H. Reynolds. Vashti is very discouraged about her art ability, until an inspiring teacher challenges her to make her very own mark in the art world. Soon Vashti sees that she too can create art and with a little encouragement she can even help others find their talent.

Music: *Moses Goes to a Concert* by Isaac Millman. Moses is deaf. He is in a special class with other deaf students. Although they may not be able to hear, Moses and his friends enjoy many activities that you and I enjoy. This is the story of how Moses' teacher makes a concert special for Moses and his classmates.

Bring a fine arts book into your classroom; it might be the inspiration for a future athlete, artist, or musician.

Dear Florida Reading Association Colleagues!

My thought in asking for this delay in publication was that the SRCFL conference is so connected to our FRA mission, not to mention mentored by FRA, that it would be a treat for all the FRA members to see highlights of that conference. You will see photos of and commentary on the SRC in the center section of this newsletter. The remainder of this editor's letter holds a few literacy treasures I've bumped into over the past few months.

One of the presenters at the SRCFL conference was Jacqueline Woodson, a writer of children's and young adult books. She is an author I did not know. Jacqueline spoke at the Saturday author's luncheon and what a treat that was! She talked of her passion for writing, how she knew when she was seven years old that she wanted to be a writer and spoke about her writing process. But the greatest moment was when she read to us from her books. She read from several books, but the most touching for me was her reading of *Snow Way*, a Newbery Honor Medal winner. *Snow Way* is a book based on her own family. She said, "This is the first time I've written a book based on some of my own family history. Show Ways', or quilts, once served as secret maps for freedom-seeking slaves. This is the story of seven generations of girls and women who were quilters and artists and freedom fighters." This writing and her Read Aloud was pure poetry. Remember April is National Poetry month!

Another poetry gem is *Don't Bump the Glump! And Other Fantasies*. This is a re-release of Shel Silverstekn's first poetry collection. And you know how I love Silverstein's poetry! This is will be a real fun treat.

Do you remember the last newsletter editor's quiz on poet Laureates? Well the poetry of Jack Prelutsky, first Children's Poet Laureate named by the Poetry Foundation in 2006, is reflected in the works of J. Patrick Lewis' new book *The World's Greatest: Poems*. It is a collection of *Guiness World Records* type facts about the biggest, "bestest", tallest, fastest...most in poetic words of wisdom.

The final little gem is a new book called *No Talking* by Andrew Clements. The fifth-grade girls and the fifth-grade boys at Laketon Elementary don't get along very well. But the *real* problem is that these kids are loud and disorderly. Then one day Dave Packer, a certified loudmouth, bumps into an idea - a big one that makes him try to keep quiet for two whole days. And it's the boys against the girls.

Many of these tidbits come from the writings in Sherri Winston's column in my local newspaper, the *Sun Sentinel*, and the authors' websites. Be sure to go to these authors' web pages for more of their writings and some great finds.

Enjoy your spring as the weather gets warmer and the close of the school year approaches. Fill these last few weeks with as much wonderful literature and as many Read Alouds as you can.

FRA LEGISLATIVE UPDATE from Florence Brainerd . . . FRA's Legislative Advocate

Legislative Update Spring 2008

Florence Brainerd, Legislative Advocate

The 2008 Legislative Session began March 4 and two weeks later representatives from FRA were on the steps of the Capitol and into the halls searching for the doors of leadership with whom to visit for the purpose of educating and persuading legislators to view Reading issues in the light of a Reading Professional. Topics discussed were:

- A continuation of support for professional development activities with planning and implementation to include local districts' involvement;
- Categorical funding for reading instruction materials;
- Governor Crist's vow to improve teacher salaries.

Those attending were FRA President Deb Wellman, President-elect Pam LaRiviere, Governmental Relations Chair Margaret Janz, and Advocate Florence Brainerd. Those visited were Chief of Staff to Speaker Rubio, Director of Policy & Budget to President Pruitt, Senate and House Chairs of the Education Committees, and the DOE Chancellor Frances Haithcock.

Bills –

There are several bills that have developed in the early weeks of the session.

• The first one is the ESOL Certification bill that was vetoed by the Governor last year. SB 286 by Senator Wise, says that there is a clear duplication of content for teachers with either Reading Certification or Reading Endorsement. The only aspects of ESOL training that are not duplicated would be language acquisition and the understanding of cultural diversity. Therefore, there is no need for an additional 300 hours. Education experts say 60 hours would be sufficient.

In the meantime, The House's companion bill, HB 491 by Rep. Carroll, hit a snag in the House and an amendment was offered to appease the south Florida Legislators. It offers the same outcome, but in a round about way. The big problem with its passing and being signed by the Governor is the education union lobby of south Florida. They feel it weakens the qualifications in teaching the non-English speaking students of south Florida.

It is not certain at this writing which version of the ESOL bill will pass, but HB 491 is moving faster and will probably be the ultimate vehicle.

It has been recommended that members of FRA contact their representatives, and especially the Governor's office at **www.charlie.christ@myflorida.com**, and urge him to sign the ESOL bill when it comes to his desk.

• The second bill, HB 7045 Revision of Curriculum Standards, would make standards for reading, math and other subjects tougher, more detailed and more relevant at every grade level. It passed the House. It next goes to the Senate, where a similar bill SB 1914 is waiting a final committee hearing.

• The third, and perhaps most important, is the Appropriations Bill. The Budget is the only bill the Legislature is required to pass during the session. Each chamber has passed its own version of the budget (SB 2900 and HB 5001). The bills now go into what is technically referred to as a Conference Committee process. The two school budgets are debated and consensus is reached. Issues that cannot be resolved by the committees are "bumped up" to the House and Senate leadership who will make the final decisions. In order to meet the constitutionally prescribed 72-hour "cooling off" period, the final product must be printed and placed on the Legislators desk by Tuesday morning, April 29.

Running parallel to the budget is the "Implementing Bill". While the budget sets forth the number of dollars allocated in each area, the Implementing Bill sets forth in great detail how those dollars are to be spent. Both bills are important.

Funds have been cut in all education programs, including Reading Programs. None were held harmless. The School Board and Superintendent Associations have lobbied and expressed their desire to make all education funds "flexible" for districts to use however it is needed.

Note: By the time this article is printed, the 2008 Session will have concluded its business and we all will know the results of the now unknown.

It is critical to maintain those relationships to ensure that our voices will be heard at times like these. I encourage you to communicate with the legislators and get to know those who represent your area. Thank them for all that they have done in the past to promote reading and address the current issues that concern you. We do have a voice that will be heard as we work together with them and DOE to accomplish our goals for reading. (It was through cooperative efforts that reading had finally made it as a categorical in the education budget.) Consider being one of the local volunteer legislative liaison for us in your area. By doing so, Florence will be able to e-mail late-breaking new directly to you for you disseminate to your local reading council and others in your district. It is a discouraging time for all of us I trust that we will be able to work together to guarantee that the strides that have been made in reading.



FRA'S LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE NEWS By Shirley Gibson

FRA will hold its annual Leadership Conference for local council leaders from around the state on Saturday, May 17, in Orlando. The focus this year is a Local Council Idea Exchange. Councils will rotate and share information in three discussion groups: service to members (brochures, newsletters, and websites); service provided through general meetings (programs, as well as council projects, events, and outreach), and service provided through membership (council membership, FRA and IRA).

Sessions will focus on professional development. Michelle Kelley and Nicki Clausen-Grace will speak on various types of readers and ways to support students during independent reading. Michelle and Nicki recently published two professional books through IRA: <u>Comprehension Shouldn't Be Silent</u> (IRA Book Club, November, 2007) and <u>R5 in Your Classroom: A Guide to Differentiating Independent</u> <u>Reading and Developing Avid Readers</u>. Shannon Ayrish will announce the eight books selected for FRA's literacy project, Children's Book Award, as well as offer ideas for using this literature. Andrea Rosenblatt will present the latest in literacy through new professional books and hot topics.

Other topics will help develop the connection between councils and the Florida Reading Association. This will include projects offered by FRA and the role of FRA in assisting educators in government relations at the state level. Leadership attendees will learn how FRA influences legislation in Tallahassee through advocacy for appropriate, quality reading instruction and funding.

CELEBRATING READ ACROSS AMERICA By Dr. Heidi Maier


