President's Message

"If your actions inspire others to dream more, learn more, do more and become more, you are a leader."

John Quincy Adams

As the school year comes to a close, it provides us with a wonderful opportunity to reflect on all that has been accomplished in our classrooms and schools during the last year. I would like to offer a few questions to guide that reflection.

1. Have I helped to grow my students' passion for reading and writing?
2. Have I helped my students to better understand the world around them through reading?
3. Have I helped my students to better communicate about the world around them through writing?
4. Have I helped to grow the level of engagement and confidence of my students as readers and writers, especially those who struggle with literacy?
5. Have I accurately measured my success with the previous four reflection questions?

I believe that the last question is critical to our continuous literacy improvement as a state. While the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test (FCAT) is a reliable and valid summative measure of reading achievement, it is important that we also measure students' passion, engagement, and confidence as readers and writers throughout the year. It is often these "soft" skills, indirectly measured by FCAT, which produce less than expected scores for our students. Fortunately, these leading indicators of student success can be measured throughout the year and instruction adjusted based on those measures.


In the coming weeks, I know many schools will review the FCAT data to compare proficiency levels within schools, across schools, and across districts. As you analyze these data, I challenge you and your colleagues to dig deeper, to bypass simplistic answers, and try to understand what has produced these summative scores for individuals and groups of students. More importantly, as you reflect back on the school year, seek to understand the instructional decisions that led to student success or a lack thereof. It is this critical reflection that will lead to improved instruction and learning for students next year. This ability to engage in courageous conversations is what distinguishes true teacher leaders. I hope you enjoy this edition of the Florida Reading Journal.

In Memoriam: E.L. Konigsburg 1930-2013



Bay County

DCRC collects gift bags at their December general meeting to take to Hubbard House for the children. Hubbard House is a shelter for abused women and their children. The Duval members look forward to providing gift bags with books, toiletries and other necessities for families who must leave their homes and go to this haven for moms and children. The bags are distributed to children in need throughout the year.

Through this project, DCRC provides children's magazine subscriptions, such as *Ranger Rick*, for two agencies; Hubbard House and Ronald McDonald House. Members donate "dollars" at one or two general meetings to fund this effort.

Pinellas County


- Council members delivered "Read to Me" t-shirts to The Kimberly Home and New Life Solutions as well as books to support their literacy projects with families in their transitional housing

Reading Supervisors of Florida

Many supervisors have served on state level work groups focusing on the standards, formative assessment item banks, and college and career readiness as well as investigating the changes to the ninety-minute reading block. Additionally, the elementary supervisors have been involved in the adoption of new core and intervention reading materials that are aligned to the CCSS.

UCF Morgridge International Reading Center

The Morgridge International Reading Center was established to be a resource for professional learning to improve the art and science of literacy acquisition and instruction. Pre-service teachers, in-service teachers, school and district administrators, parents, researchers, policymakers, non-profit organizations and others interested in the education of students can visit the Center on-line (mirc.ucf.edu) and on site to investigate and share successful instructional practices for assisting students in becoming literate.



Based on many recommendations from focus groups held with various stakeholders to establish the vision and mission of the Center, the Center collects and distributes information on successful instructional practices used nationally and internationally. Grounded in the work of titans in education, the Morgridge International Reading Center serves as a conduit of information at a national and international level with the sole purpose of improving literacy acquisition and instruction in all languages. As a conduit of information the Center, free of political affiliation, provides all stakeholders the opportunity to share breakthrough research and instructional materials in the area of literacy acquisition and instruction to better serve third millennium teachers and students.


Using technology and inter-university articulation, the Center is a catalyst for relationships among major PK-20 stakeholders. The relationship building started at the state level with inter-university literacy representatives meeting to learn and share on a variety of topics from state and national policies to international research. In addition to state university representatives meeting, the Morgridge International Reading Center collaborates with a group of distinguished professors to serve as advisors to guide the evolving form and function of the Center from a university perspective. Teachers, school district personnel, and state administrators were sought as well to complete the network of professionals. The wealth of knowledge and experiences from all these stakeholders make the Center a unique, synergistic and constantly evolving enterprise that fulfills a global need for communication to improve literacy acquisition and instruction.








