

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
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

Thank you to the following individuals and local councils who made a significant contribution to the planning and success of this conference.

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

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

When Reading and Science Merge

Lynne hopes that her book, *Groundhog's Garden Grew*, will inspire schools to transform their schoolyard into a nature center, a hands-on science center, a peaceful place to read a book and make connections to the other living things with whom we share our world.

Through her books and newsletter, *Nature's Course* (www.cee-ane.org/), Lynne Cherry is encouraging teachers to involve their students in "Participatory Democracy"—inspired by the stories in children's books. The books reach the children on an emotional level and the teacher uses them as a take-off point for environmental education and community action. For example, a student wrote to Lynne Cherry that after his teacher read his class *A River Ran Wild* he told her that orange foam had appeared on the creek where he played. The teacher took the class to investigate, following the creek upstream until they came to the factory pipe discharging the orange foam. The teacher used this as a lesson about local government and participation: they involved the EPA and the local community and were successful in stopping the flow of orange foam.

Lynne Cherry learned of the Episcopal Church's plan to develop 600 acres of old-growth forest that had been entrusted to it by Seton Belt. She encouraged children to write to the bishop of the church in Washington, DC and the children's letters were greatly responsible for the preservation of Belt Woods. 



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

Timothy Shanahan is Professor of Urban Education at the University of Illinois at Chicago where he is Director of the UIC Center for Literacy. He has been director of reading for the Chicago Public Schools, serving 437,000 children. His research focuses on the relationship of reading and writing, school improvement, the assessment of reading ability, and family literacy. He has published more than 150 research articles, chapters, and books on literacy.

Professor Shanahan is President of the International Reading Association, and he was recently appointed to the Advisory Board of the National Institute for Literacy. He is on the Advisory Board of the National Family Literacy Center, and served on the National Reading Panel, a group convened by the National Institute of Child Health and Development at the request of Congress to evaluate research on successful methods of teaching reading. He has chaired two other federal panels: one that reviewed literacy research on language minority children and one on preschool and family literacy. He is author of *Elements of Literacy: Fluency* (Rigby/SteckVaughn) an instructional program for Grades 1–3, *Treasures*, a K–5 core reading program (Macmillan/McGraw-Hill), and the *AMP Reading System*, an intervention program for striving readers in Grades 6–8 (AGS/Pearson).

Shanahan received the Albert J. Harris Award for outstanding research on reading disability from the International Reading Association, the Milton D. Jacobson Readability Research Award also from IRA, the Amoco Award for Outstanding Teaching and the University of Delaware Presidential Citation for Outstanding Achievement. He was inducted into the Illinois Reading Council Hall of Fame in 2002. He is a former first grade teacher.

I have two children of my own, Aaron and Rebecca. They're grown up now, and they're talented and creative, and when we get together we still laugh like maniacs.

Are you overwhelmed with the mountain of educational policies, mandates, high-stakes testing, and diverse student needs that come to you from every direction? If so, taking the time to reflect on what you know and the roots of that knowledge becomes critical. Join us as Janet Allen examines her journey and the giants who helped her create the map that guides her professional practice today.

Janet Allen is an international consultant recognized for her literacy work with atrisk students. She is the author of On the Same Page: Shared Reading Beyond the Primary Grades; Yellow Brick Roads: Shared and Guided Paths to Independent Reading; and, Words, Words, Words: Teaching Vocabulary in Grades 4-12 (Stenhouse Publishers); It's Never Too Late: Leading Adolescents to Lifelong Literacy (Heinemann); and co-author of Reading History: A Practice Guide to Improving Literacy (Oxford University Press); Read-Aloud Anthology (Scholastic); and There's Room for Me Here: Literacy Workshop in the Middle School (Stenhouse). She is also the author/editor of the collection titled Using Literature to Help Troubled Teenagers Cope with End-of-Life Issues (Greenwood). Janet's most recent publication is a picture book about her childhood in northern Maine, Best Little Wingman (Boyds Mills Press). She has written numerous professional articles and chapters related to young adult literature, teaching reading and writing, and vocabulary instruction and maintains an ongoing column in Voices from the Middle.

Janet taught high school reading and English in northern Maine from 1972 until 1992 when she relocated to Florida to teach English and reading education courses at the University of Central Florida. During her tenure at UCF, she directed the Central Florida Writing Project and assisted in the creation of the Orange County Literacy Project. In 1996, she created *It's Never Too Late Literacy Institutes* which are now sponsored by Staff Development for Educators. These four-day, content literacy institutes occur in various locations across the country every summer. She is currently spending her time researching, writing, speaking, and conducting literacy institutes across the country as part of her Literacy Leadership Collaborative. Dr. Allen has received several teaching awards including the Milken Foundation's National Educator Award.

Cathy was the recipient of the prestigious Paul A. Witty Award for Meritorious Service from International Reading Association (1998), received the TCU Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Research from the School of Education (1999), and has been honored as one of the Outstanding People of the 20th Century, 2000 Outstanding Intellectuals of the 20th Century, and Who's Who in the World.

Cathy has written numerous college textbooks, is an author of the Stanford Early School Achievement Test (The Psychological Corporation), and has written more than 60 research articles. Each summer, she serves on the National Faculty for the University of Notre Dame. She was the Chairperson of the National Commission to Infuse Thinking Development into the Curriculum (Washington, DC., 1991–92). Cathy has also served as a consultant to numerous school districts in the United States, Canada, Germany, Hungary, Russia, Finland, as well as several corporations and government agencies including the U.S. Department of Commerce, Wishbone PBS Series, Walt Disney, and IBM.


